Jessica v. Man (Battery)

Jessica may sue man for battery. Battery is an intentional, harmful or offensive contact with the person of another. Here, man desired to hit the sandwich because he was mad it wasn't money. Man's hand made contact with the sandwich, which was offensive because wasting food is offensive. Although the sandwich was not a part of Jessica's body, case law indicates that closely associated objects, such as those held in one's hands count as part of the person for purposes of battery. Therefore, Jessica may sue man for battery.
